The Near East University Faculty of Medicine is the only medical school in the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus (TRNC) that provides a full six-year medical education entirely within its own institution. It was established on July 20, 2008, the 34th anniversary of the Peace Operation, and began its first academic year on October 7, 2008.

In line with its founding goals and objectives, our faculty has continuously developed its institutional structure, achieving recognition both in Turkiye and internationally — particularly in Middle Eastern and various other foreign countries — as the first medical faculty of the TRNC. 

Program Information

The medical education program implemented at the Near East University Faculty of Medicine is distinguished by its integrated curriculum, in which courses during the first, second, and third years are organized by subjects rather than by academic departments. In this educational model, known as the Integrated System, each topic—for example, the circulatory system—is studied comprehensively through related disciplines such as Anatomy, Physiology, and Biochemistry, as well as relevant clinical sciences, in a coordinated and systematic manner.

The medical program is divided into two main phases: pre-clinical education (the first three years) and clinical education (the final three years). During the first, second, and third years, students also participate in the Good Medical Practice program, which aims to develop the professional skills and attitudes required of a competent physician, in addition to theoretical and practical knowledge.

In the first year, students primarily study the basic medical sciences. The second year focuses on normal human biology and the fundamentals of microbiology. The third year covers organ systems in terms of pathophysiology, pathology, pharmacology, and clinical sciences. The fourth and fifth years consist of clinical clerkships, during which students receive both theoretical and practical training through patient diagnosis and treatment in clinics, as well as through seminars, article discussions, and case presentations.

The sixth year represents the internship period prior to graduation. During this phase, medical candidates who have acquired comprehensive knowledge of the human body and gained both theoretical and practical experience in disease mechanisms and patient care assume responsibilities under the supervision of academic staff and specialist physicians, preparing for independent medical practice.

Degree Awarded

Students who successfully complete the program are awarded the degree of Doctor of Medicine (MD) — equivalent to a master's degree within the Bologna framework.

Qualification Level

QF-EHEA (Qualifications Framework for the European Higher Education Area): Level 3

EQF-LLL (European Qualifications Framework for Lifelong Learning): Level 7

Admission Requirements

Admission to the Faculty of Medicine requires a high school diploma.

- For students from the Republic of Türkiye: Admission is based on the results of the national university entrance examination administered by the Student Selection and Placement Center (ÖSYM).
- For citizens of the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus (TRNC): Admission is based on the university's own examination and placement process.
- For international students: Admission is determined by evaluation of high school graduation grades, along with an assessment of English language proficiency.

Graduation Requirements and Regulations

Students are required to complete 280 Near East University credits and successfully pass all courses in the curriculum to be eligible for graduation. The Near East University credit system is designed to include both theoretical and practical courses and corresponds to 360 ECTS credits (European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System).

The ECTS is a credit system developed to facilitate student mobility within and across universities. Since ECTS credits reflect the total workload of a student—including in-class and out-of-class activities—students participating in exchange programs can transfer their earned ECTS credits to their home university, where these credits are recognized within their academic program. As a student-centered system, ECTS supports the learning process and serves as one of the key components of the Bologna Process.

ECTS is also a tool used for the planning, review, and improvement of academic programs, thereby increasing transparency. The main difference between ECTS and the U.S. credit system lies in their calculation basis: ECTS credits are based on student workload, whereas U.S. credits are determined by contact hours (theoretical and practical hours). In general, studies have shown that 1 ECTS credit is approximately equivalent to 1.67 U.S. credits, although this ratio may vary among U.S. universities. To graduate, students must achieve a passing grade in all courses and maintain a minimum cumulative grade point average (CGPA) of 2.00 out of 4.00.

Recognition and Evaluation of Prior Learning

Students who wish to transfer from another Faculty of Medicine must prove their English proficiency if they seek admission to the English-medium program. The Faculty of Medicine only accepts full-time students; part-time or auditing students are not admitted.

Students transferring from a Faculty of Medicine in the Republic of Türkiye must have achieved an ÖYS (Student Placement Examination) score that is not lower than the minimum admission score required for that year's Near East University Faculty of Medicine. The applicant's transcript is reviewed by the Faculty of Medicine Transfer Committee, which determines the appropriate class placement.

Applications from international students are also evaluated by the same Transfer Committee, in accordance with the Faculty's Education, Teaching, and Examination Regulations.

Program Information

DURATION OF THE PROGRAM: 6 years (This duration does not include the English Preparatory Program, which is compulsory only for students enrolled in the English-medium curriculum.)

TYPE OF EDUCATION: Full-time

The main feature of the Med'cal Doctorate (MD) program at Near East University is that, during the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd years, courses are organized by topics rather than academic departments. This integrated system of education, referred to as the "Integrated Curriculum," focuses on specific subjects—for example, the circulatory system—and presents related basic medical sciences such as Anatomy, Physiology, and Biochemistry together with relevant clinical sciences in a coordinated and structured manner. The medical education program is divided into two main phases:

- The first three years constitute the pre-clinical phase, and
- The final three years comprise the clinical phase.

During the first three years, students also take part in the "Good Medical Practice" program, which aims to provide them not only with theoretical and practical knowledge but also with the skills and attitudes required to become competent and ethical physicians. In the first year, students mainly study the basic sciences. In the second year, they focus on the anatomical, physiological, histological, and biochemical foundations of body systems and the fundamentals of microbiology. The third year integrates pathophysiology, pathology, pharmacology, and clinical sciences.

The fourth and fifth years are dedicated to clinical clerkships, during which students participate in patient care and treatment under supervision. In addition to theoretical and practical sessions, seminars, case discussions, and journal meetings are held. The sixth year is the internship period, which serves as a pre-graduation phase. During this year, students take on responsibilities under the supervision of faculty members and specialists, preparing themselves for professional medical practice.

Program Learning Outcomes (PLOs)

Upon successful completion of the Medicine program, graduates will be able to:

- Describe the structure, development, and normal functioning of the human body at molecular, cellular, tissue, organ, and system levels.
- Identify and explain abnormal structures and functions of the human body based on qualified scientific
 evidence, considering the causes of diseases and their interaction with the individual and the
 environment.
- Evaluate clinical decision-making and disease management processes using evidence-based medicine principles.
- Define health and disease concepts in both individual and societal contexts; explain health-seeking behaviors, health protection, and the organization and administration of national health systems.
- Understand the fundamentals of research processes that support medical knowledge and possess sufficient foreign language proficiency to follow scientific developments.
- Take comprehensive medical histories from patients and their relatives.
- Perform physical examinations, interpret diagnostic tests, and manage diagnostic and therapeutic processes appropriately.
- Conduct medical interventions for diagnostic, therapeutic, or preventive purposes.
- Document and maintain records of medical and administrative data obtained from individuals and communities.
- Plan and implement practices to protect and improve individual and public health.
- Design, conduct, and evaluate scientific research.
- Demonstrate lifelong learning behavior by following scientific and technological advancements relevant to professional and social change.
- Fulfill professional responsibilities as physicians in accordance with ethical principles, professional
 values, and legal regulations, without discrimination based on language, religion, race, gender, or social
 and cultural differences.
- Work effectively in teams with colleagues and other healthcare professionals in the protection and improvement of health and the management of diseases.
- Strive for the protection and improvement of public health and the delivery of healthcare services for the benefit of individuals and society.

Career Opportunities for Graduates

Graduates holding the Medical Doctor (MD) degree may work as general practitioners in hospitals or pursue specialization training in a medical field of their choice. In both cases, they must meet the requirements set by the relevant country's regulations.

Access to Postgraduate Programs

Graduates may continue their education in Medical Specialization Programs or pursue Doctoral (PhD) studies.

Additional Information

Attendance is compulsory for both practical (laboratory work, discussions, seminars, field and clinical studies, etc.) and theoretical courses in Phase I, II, and III, and attendance is recorded. If a student fails to attend more than 20% of the total practical hours (for each department within the course blocks) without an excuse, they will not be allowed to take the exam for that course block and will receive a grade of "FF" (Fail). If a student is excused but misses more than 20% of the practical sessions for any discipline within a course block, they may only be allowed to sit for the exam if their excuse is approved by the Faculty of Medicine Executive Board.

Make-up sessions for departmental practical courses are held on the dates indicated in the course block schedule. If the make-up of a particular practical course cannot be conducted in an applied (hands-on) manner, the student will instead take a theoretical exam, and the grade obtained from this exam will be considered as the practical course grade.

Students who miss more than 25% of theoretical courses without a valid excuse are not permitted to take the course block exam and will receive an "FF" grade. If the absence exceeds 25% due to a valid and approved excuse, the student may be allowed to take the exam upon the approval of the Faculty Executive Board.

Important Information About Elective Courses

In order to graduate, medical students must complete seven compulsory common courses and one elective course throughout their studies. Elective courses must be selected from the list of elective courses provided in the official table. Elective courses are included in the first-year curriculum, and students are required to attend these courses online at the designated times. All elective courses must be completed by the end of Phase III.

Examination Regulations, Evaluation, and Grading

During the first three years of the Faculty of Medicine, students are assessed through multiple-choice written examinations and practical laboratory exams. At the end of each course committee in Phase I, II, and III, a Course Committee Examination is conducted. The grades obtained in these exams constitute the student's course committee exam score.

At the end of each academic year (Phase I, II, and III), a Comprehensive End-of-Year Examination is administered, covering all course committees. This examination takes place not earlier than fifteen (15) and not later than twenty-one (21) days after the completion of the final course committee exam of the term. The score obtained from this examination is recorded as the final examination score for the course committees.

In order to be successful for the year, students must pass not only the course committee examinations but also the comprehensive end-of-year examination. The Comprehensive Examination for elective courses is held on the dates specified in the Near East University academic calendar.

The End-of-Year Make-up Examination is held on dates determined annually by the Faculty Board. The make-up examinations for elective courses are conducted according to the dates stated in the academic calendar.

The overall year grade is calculated by combining 60% of the average course committee scores and 40% of the end-of-year examination score. The End-of-Year Examination Score consists of 36% from the general exam and 4% from the "Good Medical Practice" grade.

A student who receives an "FF" grade in the end-of-year examination must take the End-of-Year Make-up Examination. The final year grade is then calculated as 60% of the average course committee score plus 40% of the make-up examination score.

To pass elective courses, students must achieve at least the minimum passing grade specified in the "Near East University Undergraduate Education and Examination Regulations" in either the General Examination or Makeup Examination of the elective course.

All examination scores are evaluated on a 100-point scale and converted into letter grades in accordance with university regulations. The minimum passing grade for the year is 50 out of 100. Examination results are announced to students only as grades.

If a student fails to take both the Comprehensive End-of-Year Examination and the Make-up Examination, the year grade is recorded as "FF," regardless of midterm or committee averages. Students whose final year grade remains "Fail" after the make-up examination must repeat the same academic year until successful.

Students who fail elective course examinations (either general or make-up) must re-register for the course in the following academic year—without attendance obligation—and retake its exams. Students who fail to successfully complete elective courses by the end of Year III are not permitted to begin Year IV.

In Years IV and V (clinical clerkships), assessments include multiple-choice written exams, structured clinical examinations, and oral exams. Each clerkship concludes with an examination that covers its educational content, which may be written, oral, both, and/or practical. In evaluating performance, students' work and achievements during the clerkship period are also taken into account. The passing grade for each clerkship is 60 out of 100.

Students who fail one or more clerkships in Phase IV and V must take Make-up Examinations for those clerkships after the completion of all clerkships in that year. If they fail again, the clerkship must be repeated until a passing grade is achieved.

A student who has failed only one clerkship from the previous year, or who has transferred and completed a single clerkship, may take the next available clerkship examination as a make-up exam. If successful, they may continue with other clerkships; otherwise, the failed clerkship must be repeated. A student cannot proceed to the next academic year without successfully completing all clerkships of the current year. Students who pass all clerkship examinations continue their studies without interruption.

In Phase VI (Internship), student performance is evaluated by each department based on their work in clinics, outpatient services, laboratories, and field studies; their written patient interviews, discharge summaries (epicrises), patient care and conduct, night duties, participation in seminars, and performance in clinical meetings.

Students may appeal examination results within fourteen (14) days after the announcement of grades by submitting a petition to the Dean's Office. Appeals are reviewed by the relevant coordinator. If a clerical error is detected, the necessary correction is made; grades cannot be changed for any other reason.

Students whose absence from any course committee or clerkship exam is accepted as excused by the Faculty Administrative Board are entitled to a Make-up Examination for that specific exam. Course Committee Make-up Examinations are held on dates determined by the Faculty Administrative Board. No make-up exams are held for End-of-Year General or Make-up Examinations.

Once announced, examination dates cannot be changed. Exams may be theoretical (written, oral, or both) and/or practical (written, oral, or both). In necessary cases, practical exams may be omitted. Faculty members may, with or without prior notice, administer impromptu assessments to individual students or entire classes during lectures or practical sessions.

Students must attend examinations at the scheduled date and time. Failure to attend any part (theoretical or practical) of an exam results in an "FF" grade. Students caught cheating or attempting to cheat receive an "FF" grade and are subject to disciplinary investigation.

Students must also complete and pass the University Common Compulsory Courses as determined by the Senate of Near East University. The rules for these courses are governed by the "Near East University Undergraduate Education and Examination Regulations".

This total corresponds to 360 ECTS (European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System) credits.

Course Registration

Students who have been admitted to the Faculty of Medicine (citizens of the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus and the Republic of Türkiye) must apply to the Student Affairs Office with their official acceptance document. They will be provided with the necessary information for the registration process.

After paying the registration fee, students must return to the Student Affairs Office with the payment receipt to complete the registration procedures. Upon completion, they will be directed to the Faculty of Medicine Dean's Office, where each student will receive a student ID number and password for accessing the Student Information System (SIS).

Since the Medical Doctor (MD) Program curriculum consists predominantly of compulsory courses, medical students do not select courses online through the Student Information System. Compulsory courses such as Atatürk's Principles and Reforms and Turkish Language are included in the program. In addition, the Medical Doctor (MD) Program also includes elective courses.

Horizontal and Vertical Transfer

Citizens of the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus (TRNC) and the Republic of Türkiye who wish to transfer to Near East University must apply to the Student Affairs Office. Applications from international students are received by the International Student Office. After the registration process is completed in either of these offices, the Faculty of Medicine determines the appropriate class level for the student. Students applying for a horizontal transfer must obtain an official transcript from their previous university and submit it to the Faculty of Medicine. The decision to recognize or not to recognize the equivalency of courses previously taken at another institution rests solely with the Faculty of Medicine.

For citizens of the Republic of Türkiye, the transfer regulations of Near East University comply with the rules set by the Council of Higher Education (YÖK).

Student Attendance and Excuses

Attendance to both practical (laboratory work, discussions, seminars, fieldwork, clinical studies, etc.) and theoretical courses is compulsory for students in Phases I, II, and III, and attendance is recorded. If a student is absent without excuse from more than 20% of the total practical course hours of any department within the course committees during the academic year, the student will not be allowed to take the corresponding course committee examination and will receive an "FF" grade. If a student with a valid excuse is absent from more than 20% of the total practical course hours of any department, they may take the examination only if their excuse is accepted by the Faculty Administrative Board.

Make-up sessions for departmental practicals are held on the dates specified in the course committee schedule. If a practical cannot be repeated in an applied format, the student will instead take a theoretical examination, and the grade received from that exam will be considered as the practical course grade. If a student without excuse misses more than 25% of the total theoretical course hours of any course committee, the student will not be allowed to take the course committee examination and will receive an "FF" grade.

If the student's absences exceed 25% with a valid excuse, they may be allowed to take the exam only upon approval by the Faculty Administrative Board. To be considered excused on medical grounds during their education, a student must submit a medical report obtained from a University Hospital or another official or private inpatient healthcare institution, and this report must be approved by the Faculty Administrative Board. Medical reports outside these institutions will not be accepted. A student whose medical excuse is accepted cannot attend classes or sit for exams during the duration of the medical report. All excuse-related applications must be submitted to the Dean's Office within two weeks following the end date of the excuse. Late submissions, overdue medical reports, or reports covering only exam dates will not be processed. The Faculty Administrative Board reserves the right to accept or reject any excuse at its discretion. The attendance rules stated above apply to departmental courses, course committees, clerkships, and academic years.

Students may be granted up to one (1) year of academic leave by decision of the Faculty Administrative Board in cases of significant reasons that can be documented, or when opportunities such as scholarships, internships, or assignments outside the university that contribute to their education arise, or within the framework of applicable laws and regulations. Such permission must be requested before the start of the academic year.

Student Affairs

The Student Affairs Registration, Admission, and Accounting Units are responsible for maintaining students' records from initial registration to graduation, providing information on payment procedures, guiding students within the framework of relevant regulations, and managing documentation processes related to student affairs.

Campus Life

Library

Located directly opposite the Faculty of Economics and Administrative Sciences building, the Grand Library houses over 1,000,000 open-shelf books, more than 150,000,000 electronic journals, 7,000 DVDs, 17 film viewing cabins, 12 individual and group study rooms, four amphitheaters with a total capacity of 1,000 people, a 350-seat theater, a 600-seat cafeteria, and 600 study desks.

With these facilities, it serves as a world-class cultural and information access center. The Grand Library is open 24 hours a day and provides free access to all users. The information center, equipped with the latest digital technologies, can be accessed online from anywhere. Additionally, the wireless network across the campus allows students to reach any information they need at any time.

Campus Traffic Rules and Safety

The Near East University campus operates under specific traffic regulations designed to ensure the safety and comfort of all students, staff, and visitors. Traffic compliance is monitored 24/7 by NEU security personnel, and disciplinary measures may be applied when necessary.

Understanding and adhering to these rules contribute to creating a safer and more organized campus environment for everyone.

Traffic Flow and Right of Way: Traffic within the NEU campus flows on the left lane. Drivers are required to use the left side of the road and follow right-of-way rules to allow smooth traffic movement for all vehicles.

Pedestrian and Bicycle Priority: Pedestrians and cyclists have priority on crosswalks and bicycle paths. Drivers should reduce their speed and proceed carefully in these areas to ensure a safe environment for both pedestrians and cyclists.

Speed Limit: The maximum speed limit on campus is 40 km/h. Observing this limit is essential to prevent accidents and maintain overall safety.

Use of Horns and Loud Music: Honking and playing loud music are strictly prohibited on campus. Adhering to this rule helps maintain a peaceful atmosphere for everyone.

Traffic Signs and Road Markings: Traffic signs and road indicators have been placed throughout the campus to ensure safe and orderly traffic flow. Compliance with these signs is vital for maintaining safety and organization.

Routes and Parking Areas: Drivers must use designated routes and park only in authorized parking areas in accordance with parking regulations. Proper parking contributes to smoother traffic circulation and campus safety.

Transportation Services

Campus–Nicosia / Nicosia–Campus Shuttles: Round-trip shuttles operate between 06:45 and 22:15, allowing staff to travel safely and comfortably between the campus and Nicosia throughout the day.

This layout promotes physical activity and minimizes the need for motorized transport. Additionally, bicycles and electric scooters are available as alternative, environmentally friendly transportation options.
